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PROFESSIONAL PROFILE

After graduating from UC Davis School of Veterinary Medicine, I worked at Littleton Large Animal Clinic for a year as the resident intern. I took the foundation that I learned there and applied those standards at the private practices I worked in, and in the creation of my own equine practice. I have always worked on a mix of performance and pleasure horses. My special interests over the years have been lameness and surgery, but I enjoy all aspects of practice.

I created and have managed my own equine veterinary practice since 1997. Our practice has included up to 4 veterinarians and 18 staff at its peak but at the present time, given the economy and horse market, it is very lean; back to just me, a recently-graduated veterinarian, and a small staff. I keep up with advances in the field through frequent continuing education, self-study, and strong relationships with colleagues.

I have taken what I have learned through my career and created a specialized equine hospital and ambulatory practice that prides itself on quality veterinary medicine and novel approaches to the delivery of excellent customer service. I am a lifelong horseman, and I use those skills to enrich my practice of equine veterinary medicine and improve the delivery of service. I speak Spanish well enough to converse sufficiently with my Spanish-speaking clients.

I strongly believe in educating horse owners about equine health so that they can become partners in the care of their horses. Over the years, I have made a real effort to educate my horse-owning clientele through published writings, seminars and the development of my practice website, www.thalequine.com.

PERSONAL PROFILE

My family is South African and they are innovators. They immigrated to the United States in 1949. My father, Alan Thal M.D. PhD FACS, spent his childhood summers on his uncle's sheep farm in South Africa, where he fell in love with the ranching lifestyle

and horses. My father was an accomplished steeplechase rider and polo player.

My father had a distinguished career as an academic surgeon, starting at the University of Minnesota (and was on the team of doctors that pioneered open-heart surgery), Wayne State University, Johns Hopkins, and Kansas University. He was board certified in thoracic surgery, and published over 100 scientific papers in the fields of thoracic (especially esophageal) surgery and shock. My father developed several important surgical procedures and invented innovative pieces of surgical equipment, some of which I use today in my equine veterinary practice.

I was born in Kansas and we had a farm with horses and cattle just outside of Kansas City. In 1971, when I was five, our family moved to a ranch near Mora, New Mexico. My father continued in private surgical practice in Las Vegas, New Mexico for 23 years. Locals wondered why people would fly into that little Northern New Mexico town from all over the Country to have my father operate on them. He retired in 1994 because of disabling illness and has lived on the family ranch since. In retirement, he learned to oil paint as a hobby. He has painted almost daily and has become quite an accomplished artist.

I grew up on the family ranch working cattle, riding and training horses, building fences, corrals, ditches and dams, planting trees, putting up hay, irrigating hay land, watching wildlife and working on the land. That experience formed the basis for my life interests. To this day, I am passionate about sustainable agriculture and native wildlife and fisheries. The ranch and my family are primary draws that brought me back to New Mexico.

My mother, Felicia Thal, was the daughter of pioneer South African parents who started the first hotel with electricity in South Africa, aptly named "The Electric Hotel." She was trained in history but struck out in many different directions. She managed our Hereford cattle operation, starting in the early 1960's, at our farm in Kansas and continuing at our New Mexico ranch until 2004.

In 1992, my mother was named New Mexico Cattle Grower's "Cattleman of the Year," no small achievement given the politics of the cattle industry in New Mexico. She was recently honored at the New Mexico Cattle Grower's Annual Meeting in 2010, and referred to in the honorary speech as a "Battle Axe" who was vital to the formation of the New Mexico Beef Council in the 1980's.

Among many other achievements over the years, she was also an instrumental force in establishing the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum in Las Cruces. My

mother is also a gourmet cook. I always look forward to coming home for the holidays for a great meal. After over 62 years in the United States, she still speaks with a pronounced South African accent.

My older brother John Thal is an attorney with the firm of Atkinson Thal & Baker P.C. in Albuquerque. My brother worked on the family farms for decades, and is just now preparing to move back to the family ranch for his retirement. My sister, Alyson Thal is a doctor of family medicine and owns Corrales Family Practice in Corrales, NM.

I live with my wife, Kristin, and my young son, Russell on our veterinary property in Santa Fe, NM. My son is enamored with beetles, tractors and fishing.
